Bachelor of Commerce Di Pietro Family First in the Family Scholarship recipient

As an only child of immigrant parents, being the first in the family to attend university was a terrifying thought. However, the opportunities provided to me by the Di Pietro Family First in the Family Scholarship have allowed me to excel in various areas of my university life and for that I am thankful for their generosity.

The scholarship allowed me to no longer dwell in the 'what ifs' and 'when wills' that fogged my head as I began university. Stressful questions such as, 'Can I afford my constant train, tram and bus tickets to university?' and 'Will I be able to perform just as greatly without the technology I desperately need?' were answered as I was provided with the financial flexibility to purchase these necessities.

As an only child with no relatives other than immediate family in Australia, I was convinced if I failed, no one would be there to

help. But the community I gained through the Abernethy Scholars Program gave me plentiful networking opportunities with mentors, industry professionals and alumni which has led to long-lasting connections with people willing to guide me through my university journey.

These opportunities further elevated my university experience by encouraging me to apply to university clubs, where I've now held multiple leadership positions and created lifelong memories.

Upon graduation, I will pursue a career in management consulting or investment banking where I'll be able to benefit from the many skills I've gained through club involvement and participating in case competitions.

We have all felt or are chasing the moment when we can relish in our hard work paying off – a sense of euphoria incomparable to anything else. I experienced this when receiving news I was a recipient of the Duncan and Jan Andrews Scholarship. I felt seen and recognised like never before.

Being the eldest daughter in a first-generation immigrant family can be a strange experience. There is expectation you live life for your family. You accompany your parents to appointments and translate for them. You help sign forms and fill out applications. You bear the burden for younger siblings' mistakes and care for the whole family. You are more aware of your parents' sacrifices and when they cry because of all they have done, you hug them and say you will not let them down. The scholarship meant I had succeeded in the first step. I was financially self-sufficient and my family could depend on me.

I am incredibly grateful to receive the Margaret Abernethy Scholarship for Leadership in Community Engagement. It has opened doors to exciting new opportunities, furthering my mission to create tangible impact in the community.

University has been a whirlwind and daunting at times. I began working as a volunteer tutor for students of Victorian schools underrepresented at the University. As I gained confidence, I expanded into volunteer consulting projects, including giving advice to an organisation that helps disadvantaged Australian women find full-time work

The scholarship gives me time to focus on community impact projects including as part of the sheCommerce (see page 17) steering committee. Meeting high-school girls who are interested in commerce was eye-opening. I was impressed at their understanding and curiosity, but I observed their lack of confidence to pursue commerce because it is known to be male dominated. This problem is driving low participation rates from female students and is something I and many other students are addressing in these initiatives.

As a woman in the Bachelor of Commerce, I've had amazing mentors and role models supporting me. I want to become the same role model and mentor for younger girls, reminding them of their immense potential, and helping them build the confidence and courage to tackle any degree or career.

I am currently working part-time as a Finance Strategy and Performance Consultant at KPMG Australia and will start a Juris Doctor at Melbourne Law School this year.

Bachelor of Commerce Bertalli Family Foundation Scholarship recipient, Melbourne Access Scholarship recipient



As a rural student from Western Australia, the Bertalli Family Foundation and Melbourne Access scholarships have helped me to get settled after moving to Melbourne. I'm very grateful for the financial support to pursue my education and seek new opportunities at university.

Since moving I've had to adjust to being away from the support of family and friends. Covid-19 lockdowns were especially challenging with online classes, social-distancing and masks being new to me. Despite this unfamiliar environment, the scholarships boosted my confidence and motivation and I kept pushing ahead. This year I am thrilled to be back on campus and will connect with more of my peers through clubs and societies.

One of the biggest benefits of the scholarships has been the opportunity to connect with mentors and senior students. Research funded by philanthropy

Professor Rosemary Addis AM

Professor Rosemary Addis AM is a globally recognised director and strategist with a focus on scaling and transforming markets for impact.

Her current work focuses on investment in impact to drive innovation and value creation, and the role of governance and stewardship for impact. Her industry work focuses on demystifying debates around Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) and impact, and advising boards navigating the changing relationship between organisations, markets, society and the environment.

She has advised governments and multi-laterals, including UNDP and the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), including leading global strategy for initial phases of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) Impact initiative. She is a member of a World Bank Steering Group for Innovative Finance, and Non-Executive Director of Indigenous Business Australia.

She has published research on a range of topics related to SDG, including: creative disruption with the goal of adding sustainable value; impact investment as a driver of positive impact at scale; and widening participation and deepening practice for impact investments.



Professor Lisa Cameron

Professor Lisa Cameron is an empirical micro-economist whose research focuses on social welfare in Southeast Asia, China and Australia. She uses econometrics, survey data, administrative data and experimental methods to research the welfare of disadvantaged and marginalised groups.

Her past research topics include: the relationship between cash transfers and domestic violence; consequences of criminalising sex work; behavioural impacts of China's one child policy; effectiveness of sanitation programs; consequences of child marriage; improving the welfare of international migrant workers; and, most recently, an evaluation of an online intervention designed to influence gender norms around women's work. Her research on Australia includes an evaluation of the expansion of social housing and the determinants of wellbeing among Indigenous youth.

She is the James Riady Chair of Asian Economics and Business in the Faculty of Business and Economics at the University of Melbourne and Program Director of the Disadvantage and Wellbeing in the Asia-Pacific group at the Melbourne Institute.



Associate Professor Laura Panza

Associate Professor Laura Panza's field of expertise is economic history with research that blends qualitative methods based on archival research with a quantitative approach.

Her research is centred around: trade, globalisation, and de-industrialisation in the nineteenth century; relationships between income inequality and conflict; causes and consequences of ethnic segregation and discrimination; and the relationship between historical inequality and living standards. Many of her research contributions focus on the economies of the Near East in the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, specifically on the historical roots of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Other work addresses major themes in world economic history, including the role played by trade intensification between Europe and the Americas in the pacification of Europe during 1640-1900, and the role of early Christianity in the persecution of minorities in Europe (Jews, heretics) during 1100-1800.

Her research has helped us understand Australian economic history during the early colonial period by measuring settlers' living standards, and studying the relationship between growth and income inequality during the transition from convict to free labour markets.



sheCommerce Program

sheCommerce was launched in 2022 to address the underrepresentation of women among the Bachelor of Commerce cohort.

It is an immersive and academic enrichment program for Year 9-12 high school students who identify as women or non-binary. Students are encouraged to apply if they are passionate about leadership and pursuing a career where they can impact change. In its first year, sheCommerce hosted almost 80 high-school students at two camps where they were introduced to commerce as a discipline. Activities were run to foster their curiosity and encourage them to consider tertiary study in commerce.

The program will welcome larger cohorts over the next four years, and will include a work experience component and a mentoring program with female students who are studying the second or third year of the Bachelor of Commerce.



Keynote speaker



Ms Jennifer Nason is a Global Chairman of Investment Banking at J.P. Morgan in New York. She is a global leader in international business with almost 40 years of experience in high-level project management, acquisitions and investment banking.

Ms Nason graduated from the University of Melbourne in 1983 with a Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Commerce

(Honours). She began her career at the Victorian Government as an infrastructure project analyst, working on the development of state projects, including the National Tennis Centre in Melbourne.

She joined J.P. Morgan's Melbourne office in 1986 and since then, over the span of 36-years at the firm, has worked in the Project Finance and Mergers & Acquisition (M&A) groups focused on the Natural Resources sector; in the Retail Investment Banking client coverage team as Group Head; and, for the last 23 years, leading the Technology, Media and Telecommunications global client practice, with a focus on strategic M&A, debt and equity financing.

She also co-founded and chaired the Investment Banking Women's Network at J.P. Morgan in the mid-1990s.

Today as a Global Chairman of the Investment Banking practice, she sits on the Executive Committee of the Investment Bank and is responsible for many of the firm's key investment banking relationships around the world.

Over her career she has been involved in many key transactions including: IBM's US\$34 billion acquisition of Red Hat; Scripps Networks Interactive's US\$14.6 billion sale to Discovery Communications; 21st Century Fox's £11.7 billion acquisition of Sky PLC; Verizon Communication's acquisition of Vodafone's US\$130 billion stake in Verizon Wireless; GE's US\$18.1 billion sale of NBCU to Comcast; Virgin Media's US\$23.3 billion sale to Liberty Global; Facebook's US\$16 billion IPO; Nokia's US\$15.6 billion acquisition of Alcatel-Lucent; Frontier Communication's US\$11 billion acquisition of wireline assets from Verizon; and Discovery's US\$43 billion acquisition of WarnerMedia from AT&T.

Ms Nason is currently a director of Rio Tinto and member of the Partnership for New York City Innovation Council. She is a former Chairman and a Director of the American Australian Association.

She lives in New York with her four children.

The Rising Star Award for Young Alumni is presented to an individual aged 35 and under who has demonstrated an outstanding level of professional achievement and community involvement since graduating from the University of Melbourne and/or recognition by colleagues and peers of outstanding leadership and impact as a global citizen, over a period of at least five years.

Ms Rona Glynn-McDonald is a Kaytetye woman who grew up in Mparntwe on Arrernte Country. With ties to storytelling, economics and narrative change, she works to shape future systems that centre First Nations people, knowledge and solutions. She is the founding CEO of Common Ground and co-founder of First Nations Futures.


After finishing high school in 2014, Ms Glynn-McDonald moved to undertake a Bachelor of Commerce at the University of Melbourne, majoring in economics and finance.

She has since worked in policy at the Central Land Council, the Research Unit for Indigenous Languages at the University of Melbourne, Reconciliation Victoria, and the Foundation for Young Australians.

She was previously Director of First Nations at YLab, a social enterprise that puts young people with diverse lived experiences at the centre of designing and developing innovative and impactful solutions to complex social issues.

In 2020, she was a finalist for the Victorian Young Achiever awards and was awarded a Westpac Social Change Fellowship. In 2019 she was a recipient of The Diana Award and was named a 'Woman of the Future' by Women's Weekly.

Ms Glynn-McDonald works as an advisor to companies and organisations across the not for profit, retail, sport and philanthropy sectors. Through her work across different sectors she is shaping futures grounded in First Nations knowledge, reciprocity and economic justice.



Entrepreneurial Leadership Award

The Entrepreneurship Leadership Award is presented to an individual who has achieved significant and recognised impact in the entrepreneurial ecosystem over time.

Mr Tom Griffith is co-founder and Director of Emma & Tom's. He has over 30 years of experience as a global leader in accounting, investment, acquisitions, and entrepreneurship.

Mr Griffith graduated from the University of Melbourne in 1986 with a Bachelor of Commerce, majoring in economics and accounting. He joined Ernst & Young where he gained his chartered accounting qualification and a Graduate Diploma in Applied Finance and Investment, and his first experience as a manager. In 1993 he joined investment bank McIntosh Corporate (now Merrill Lynch) working in corporate finance and asset acquisitions. In 1996 Tom joined Mazars in London, consulting to French multinationals and advising the United Nations Security Council during the first Gulf War.

In 2001, Mr Griffith joined London-based media start up Mongrel Worlds as the CFO. It was during leisure time on his way back to Australia, on the ski slopes of North America, that he first discovered whole fruit smoothies and began plans for a new business venture.

In Australia he recruited Emma Welsh to assist him with the launch of the new premium fruit smoothie brand, Emma & Tom's, The company now stocks over 8,000 Australian retail outlets with their range of fruit smoothies, kombucha and healthy snacks via a fleet of forty company-operated refrigerated vans. Emma and Tom's is also sold in Southeast Asia and the Middle Fast.

Mr Griffith is a Non-Executive Director of Sydney based investment bank, Record Point, a NED of mining services and SaaS company Interlate and a keynote speaker with Saxton Speakers Group.

He is father to two teenage daughters and enjoys skiing, surfing, and running with them during his free time.

Leadership Award


The Leadership Award recognises an individual who has achieved significant and recognised impact in business, government or the non-profit sector through leadership in career to date.

Ms Joy Linton is a global finance leader with extensive experience and a demonstrated track record of success as a global Chief Financial Officer (CFO), with more than 30 years of experience in complex, highly regulated businesses across healthcare and other industries.

Ms Linton is CFO of global biotech CSL Limited. She leads the Global Finance organisation, including the CSL Behring, CSL Vifor and CSL Segirus businesses, and its accompanying strategy. She is responsible for managing the financial aspects of CSL's global strategy and serves as the company's chief financial steward. Her accountabilities include financial planning, reporting, capital management, tax, treasury, and investor relations.

Previously, Ms Linton served as CFO and Executive Director at global health insurance company Bupa and earlier as the General Manager of Health Services for Bupa UK. Prior to joining Bupa, she was CFO of National Foods, one of Australia's largest food and beverage companies. She was also a Non-Executive Director of Bega Cheese Ltd, an ASX-200 listed company.

Ms Linton earned a Bachelor of Commerce degree from the University of Melbourne in 1986. She is a fellow of the Financial Services Institute of Australasia and a graduate member of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.



Outstanding Achievement Award

The Outstanding Achievement Award is given to an individual who has achieved long-term, sustained and outstanding achievement and leadership in business, government or the non-profit sector.

Mr Ross Adler is a distinguished businessman with a long career in international trade, and a significant contributor to the arts and education.

He graduated from the University of Melbourne with a Bachelor of Commerce in 1966 and obtained a Master of Business Administration from Columbia University in 1969.

He began his career in international trade at Brown and Dureau Ltd, which he later ran and sold to Australian Paper Manufacturers (APM, now Amcor), becoming Deputy Managing Director of APM in 1982. In 1984 Ross was appointed Managing Director and CEO of Santos, a position he held until 2000.

Mr Adler has held numerous directorships with major Australian corporations, including Director of the Commonwealth Bank of Australia, Director of Telstra Corporation, Chairman of the Australian Trade Commission, and Chairman of Domino's Pizza Enterprises. He is currently Chairman of Amtrade International.

He is a longstanding contributor to the arts and education. In the arts he has served in a number of roles including Chairman of the Art Gallery of South Australia, Chairman of the Adelaide Arts Festival, and currently as a Board member of the National Portrait Gallery of Australia Foundation. In education, he served as member of Council, Chair of the Finance Committee and Deputy Chancellor of the University of Adelaide and was honoured as a Doctor of the University in 2011. He served Melbourne Grammar School for many years as President of the Foundation, Chair of the Finance Committee and Deputy Chair of the Council.

Mr Adler became an Officer of the Order of Australia in 1999, received a Centenary Medal in 2001 and was awarded the Companion of the Order of Australia in 2007.


