BRINGING THE PIECES TOGETHER

Artist Statement – Prof Colin Ferguson Portrait

Colin Ferguson was a distinguished figure in the fields of auditing, forensic accounting, and information systems.

Colin Ferguson's professional journey began at Peat Marwick Mitchell & Co (now KPMG) before a move into academia where he imparted his knowledge globally. Renowned for his research and teaching, Colin held senior positions at the University of Queensland and the University of Melbourne. While at Melbourne Colin played a foundational role in establishing the Centre for Accounting and Industry Partnerships and the Australian Accounting Hall of Fame. During this time, he also served on various professional and editorial boards and was President of the Accounting and Finance Association of Australia and New Zealand. His legacy, marked by extensive publications and influential leadership, endures beyond his passing in 2014.

Embarking on the task of painting Colin's posthumous portrait was both an honour and an emotional challenge, charged with artistic and representational complexities. Rather than simply depicting his role in accounting, my aim was to capture Colin's impact on fostering connections within the academic community and beyond.

Through heartfelt conversations with his former colleagues and most notably his son Patrick, I gained insights into Colin's deep fascination with how people interact with computers to make decisions in their professional and personal lives. A core narrative began to emerge, being 'Jigsaw Pieces' and with an already perceived notion that puzzle pieces represent solving and connecting, I thought it a perfect visual to expand on. Colin had a much more organic and rounded approach to his work, as opposed to a traditional and linear method, the puzzle pieces have that contour, that rounded shape, and in the end, they need to fit and join together to become one. The abstract shape of the pieces somewhat resembles a person and or persons, and in understanding Colin had a special way to unite people, the Jigsaw represents this, ultimately forming part of the 'bigger picture'.

The painting process commenced with meticulous planning, including the creation of a plywood model to refine composition, lighting, and angles along with numerous sketches and studies. I decided to have Colin sitting on the 'structure' to have him within the conversation, emerged in his philosophy, and being graciously loaned his signature leather jacket helped enormously when I had a model sit for me, to develop the pose during the process. Leaving the jigsaw pieces in their raw timber state was a personal homage to Colin's affinity for craftsmanship, particularly carpentry.

In essence, this portrait seeks to encapsulate Colin Ferguson's multidimensional legacy, honouring his intellectual rigor, visionary leadership, and profound capacity for bringing people together.



EXCELLENCE REWARDED

Halls of Fame are typically associated with the accolades bestowed on sporting greats. Geoff Burrows' *Excellence Rewarded* records how this concept came to be applied to Australians who have made substantial contributions to the advancement of the accounting discipline, domestically and internationally.

The book celebrates the 49 individuals – variously, academics, office-bearers, practitioners, regulators and standard setters – admitted to the Australian Accounting Hall of Fame at awards ceremonies during 2010–2024. These accounting luminaries are profiled according to a range of criteria, including demography, gender and disciplinary specialisations.

Also included are comparisons with counterpart halls of fame in the US and Canada. Not overlooked are the 15 equally distinguished individuals who have delivered what were initially labelled “occasional addresses” at awards ceremonies. More recently these presentations have been re-titled “Colin Ferguson Orations”, in honour of the Hall’s seminal figure, the late Colin Ferguson.

While the tone of *Excellence Rewarded* is largely celebratory, attention is also drawn to sections of the accounting profession possibly overlooked or under-represented in the nomination process as well as identifying future challenges to the Hall’s existence and relevance.

COLIN FERGUSON ORATION

The Colin Ferguson Oration was established in 2018 to commemorate the instrumental role played by Colin in the creation, in 2010, of the Australian Accounting Hall of Fame.

Colin Brian FERGUSON (1949–2014)

Colin Ferguson built an international reputation for work encompassing auditing, forensic accounting, and accounting information systems. Following a short stint in practice with KPMG Melbourne – a service of which he was immensely proud – Colin’s academic career started at Deakin University followed by professorial appointments at the University of Queensland and the University of Melbourne. As a Director of the Centre for Accounting and Industry Partnerships Colin helped to foster and strengthen ‘town and gown’ links between the University of Melbourne’s Department of Accounting and Business Information Systems (now Department of Accounting), the profession and wider business community.

Colin was instrumental in the creation of the Australian Accounting Hall of Fame.

GEOFF BURROWS

The 2025 Colin Ferguson Oration is presented by Geoff Burrows.

Geoff Burrows is a graduate of the University of Melbourne, holding the University's BCom and MCom degrees. He worked initially as a secondary teacher and then as a budgetary control officer with International Harvester Inc. before embarking on an academic career as a lecturer at Prahran College of Advanced Education (now Deakin University). He moved to the Department of Accounting and Business Law (predecessor to the current Department of Accounting) at the University of Melbourne in 1971.

During 30 years on the full-time academic staff at Melbourne Geoff headed the Department of Accounting and Business Law during 1987-90 and was Associate Dean of the Faculty of Business and Economics during 1993-96. His research interests encompass accounting history, financial analysis and the sugar industry. He has also consulted extensively to a range of private and public-sector entities, principally in the road and air transport and sugar industries. Geoff has published extensively in leading accounting and accounting history journals including *Accounting Organizations and Society*, *Accounting Horizons*, *Accounting History Review*, *Accounting History*, *Australian Accounting Review*, *Australian Economic Review*, *Management Accounting Research*, *Abacus* and the *International Sugar Journal*.

In 1986 Geoff's co-authored *The Canecutters* won the Fellowship of Australian Writers local history award. In 2008 he received the Academy of Accounting Historians Hourglass Award for contributions to accounting history.

Geoff retired from full-time academic life in 2001 and, as a Principal Fellow in the Department of Accounting has remained active as researcher, consultant, editor and author. He is particularly noted for the following commissioned histories:

Catherine Livingstone is one of Australia’s most respected business leaders. She is a Chartered Accountant who is known for her contributions to accounting, corporate governance, science, innovation and education.

Catherine Livingstone was born in Nairobi, Kenya and migrated to Australia with her family as a child. She graduated with a first-class honours degree in Accounting from Macquarie University in Sydney in 1977. After graduation, she commenced her career with Price Waterhouse, working in public practice in Sydney and London.

After qualifying as a Chartered Accountant, Catherine moved into a corporate accounting role with Nucleus Ltd, rising to become Chief Financial Officer (CFO). In 1994 she was made Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Cochlear, which was then owned by Pacific Dunlop. When Cochlear listed on the Australian Stock Exchange (ASX) in 1995, Catherine became the first Australian female Chartered Accountant to be CEO of an ASX-listed company. Under Catherine’s tenure as CEO, Cochlear, best known for the ‘bionic ear’, commercialised new technologies and grew its international footprint. Her leadership helped set the stage for Cochlear’s continued success and global expansion, making it one of Australia’s most successful and innovative companies.

After leaving Cochlear, Catherine pursued a career as a non-executive director. She was the first woman to chair the Commonwealth Bank of Australia (2017-2022), and also chaired the boards of Telstra (2000-2016) and the CSIRO (2016-2021). In addition, she was the first woman President of the Business Council of Australia (2014-2016). Catherine has served on the boards of Macquarie Group, Worley Parsons, Goodman Fielder and Rural Press.

Catherine has championed the role of corporate governance and the advancement of women in business. She was President of Chief Executive Women (2007-2008), and a driving force in the Federal Government program, Board Links, which aimed to increase the number of women in public sector directorships. Catherine has championed the importance of accounting and STEM education for young people, particularly girls.

While Catherine is well-known as a director on the boards of some of Australia’s largest companies and organisations, she has also supported the not-for-profit sector and contributed to government reviews, including through membership of the Prime Minister’s Business Advisory Council. She was a director of the Royal Institute of Australia, President of the Australian Museum Trust, Patron of the Australian Design Innovation Network, and is currently a director of the Australian Ballet. In 2016, Catherine was appointed to the Chancellorship of UTS, a position she currently holds.

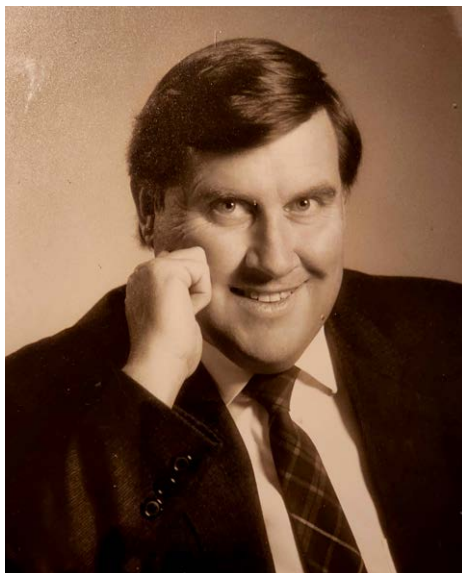

Catherine has been awarded Honorary Doctorates of Science, Business and Letters from Murdoch, Macquarie, Sydney, Wollongong and UTS Universities. She received the Chartered Accountant in Business Award from the Institute of Chartered Accountants in Australia in 2000. Catherine is a Fellow of the Chartered Accountants of Australia and New Zealand, of the Australian Institute of Company Directors, the Australian Academy of Science and the Australian Academy of Science and Engineering.

In 2008, Catherine was appointed an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO), for “service to the development of Australian science, technology and innovation policies, to the business sector through leadership and management roles and as a contributor to professional organisations”. In 2024, she was appointed a Companion of the Order of Australia (AC) for “eminent service to business, particularly through governance and strategic reform, to tertiary education, to science, technology and innovation capability development, and to the arts.”

Catherine Livingstone’s career demonstrates the power that a foundation in accounting knowledge and skills can provide to making contributions to the economy and society across diverse sectors and roles.

Ian Mackintosh made a significant contribution to the accounting profession for many decades, creating a substantial legacy with significant aspects of financial and non-financial reporting and disclosure, across both the private and public sectors, nationally and internationally.

After moving from New Zealand to Australia, Ian worked for Coopers & Lybrand, where he was the ACT office Managing Partner 1981-1995. It was during this time in Canberra that Ian first became involved in standard-setting; and in particular, the passion for the public sector that would shape his career. The fact that Australia led the world in the adoption of accrual accounting and reporting in the public sector is in no short part due to Ian's commitment to high quality reporting, disclosure and transparency.

While in Canberra, Ian was appointed a member of the University of Canberra Council, serving for 12 years, and later becoming an Adjunct Professor and Fellow of the University.

In 1983, Ian was appointed as an inaugural member of the Public Sector Accounting Standards Board (PSASB) of the Australian Accounting Research Foundation (AARF). This was a voluntary position. Ian went on to become Chair of the PSASB, and in this role had a major influence on the ongoing development of public sector accounting and financial reporting in Australia, across all levels and government, federal, state and local. He was Chair of the PSASB when it merged with the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) at the start of 2000.

In 1991, Ian was appointed an inaugural member of the newly reconstituted AASB. He remained a member until 1995, when he was Deputy Chair. During this time, Ian chaired the AASB's Urgent Issues Group, and was a member of the Financial Reporting Council, the body overseeing the development and codification of corporate financial reporting practices in Australia.

The Australian Securities and Investment Commission (ASIC) appointed Ian as Chief Accountant in 2000, a position he held until 2002, when he moved to the World Bank. It was at this time that Ian's international influence grew. While based in Australia, he served as the Chair of the International Federation of Accountants Public Sector Committee (PSC) (2000-2003). In this role, he was a member of the Likierman Review, which led to the formal establishment of the International Public Sector Accounting Standards Board (IPSASB) as the independent standard-setter for the public sector. At the World Bank, Ian was one of five Regional Managers, with responsibility for the South Asia Region. He was a member of the bank's global policy development committee, which was responsible for determining the bank's position on governance and accounting.

Ian’s international influence grew as he was appointed as Chairman of the UK Accounting Standards Board (2004-2011). His involvement in promoting public sector accounting quality continued via chairing the OECD’s Public Sector Accruals Symposium from 2006-2010. From 2011 to 2016, Ian was Vice-Chairman of the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB), providing ongoing leadership in the harmonisation of global financial reporting practices.

Following his retirement from the IASB, Ian chaired the Corporate Reporting Dialogue (CRD) from 2017-2021. Its Better Alignment Project brought together participants such as the Carbon Disclosure Project (CDP), the Global Reporting Initiative (GRI), the International Integrated Reporting Council (IIRC) and Sustainability Accounting Standards Board (SASB), to pave the way for the creation of the International Sustainability Standards Board (ISSB). Sustainability reporting standards are now guiding the reporting of non-financial environmental, social and governance information, the better reporting of risk, and integration of financial and non-financial information.

Ian passed away in 2023 at the age of 77. He was remembered by colleagues as principled, perceptive, highly intelligent, focused and thorough; unafraid of putting the public interest ahead of commercial pressures; a good friend to many, and modest about his many significant achievements and contributions to standard-setting and reporting.
